NHS England in London publishes case for change that could lead to cancer and heart disease 'super centres' to save thousands of lives

28 October 2013 - 08:43

More than 1,000 extra lives could be saved in London every year, if care for patients with cancer and heart disease is more joined-up and new 'super centres' within a network of services across north and east London are approved.

The case for change, put forward by cancer and heart disease doctors and nurses, could see a greater focus on joined-up care spanning prevention and earlier diagnosis through to treatment. The proposals suggest that fewer designated centres could provide world-class care to those needing the most specialist treatment. This is in response to the fact that in London, two thirds of early deaths are a result of cancer and heart disease.

Under the proposals, St Bartholomew's Hospital would become the centre for specialist treatment of heart disease, and University College Hospital, working within a system of hospitals including The Royal London, St Bartholomew's, The Royal Free and Queen's in Romford, would become a centre for the specialist treatment of cancer.

These centres would act as hubs in a new connected system of care including local hospitals, primary and community care services that would provide consistently excellent services and deliver most care close to patients' homes.

If approved, these new arrangements would be delivered progressively over the next four years with the specialist centres open by April 2015. This would ensure patients needing complex procedures, such as stem cell transplants and intricate heart surgery have access to highly-trained senior consultants and diagnostic facilities, 24 hours day.

Further work is now underway to develop a full business case before taking any final proposals forward for further consideration and testing with the public.

Dr Andy Mitchell, Regional Medical Director at NHS England which is leading the review, said:

"Clinicians have recommended that most people with cancer and heart disease should continue to be cared for locally, but that the small number of patients who need complex treatment are cared for in specialist centres.

"One of the great NHS success stories is the creation of hyper-acute stroke services in London, which have saved nearly 400 lives and have driven improvements across the whole care pathway since introduced in 2010. This plan could replicate this success in cancer and cardiovascular care.

"Currently, the care available for cancer patients and cardiovascular disease is variable. If we were to improve local survival rates for heart disease and all cancers in line with the rest of England, more than 1,200 lives could be saved each year - that's around 200 extra lives saved for cancer and 1,000 for heart disease.

"Patients need senior consultants to assess their condition and agree the best treatment, but consultants are not available 24 hours a day in all places. Evidence shows that dedicated specialist centres staffed by expert teams and equipped with the best technology and research capability save lives."

The recommendations build on the UK strategy to bring equity and excellence to specialised services, and the London-wide reviews in 2010 which found that Londoners with cancer and heart disease had poorer outcomes and experience than those treated elsewhere in the country. Professor David Fish, Managing Director of UCLPartners, which facilitated the early work for these proposals with local clinicians, said: "There has been great progress in cancer and cardiovascular care in recent years but unfortunately these diseases are still responsible for around two-thirds of early deaths in London.

"We have some of the best cancer and heart experts in the country, but our services are often not joined up, leading to later diagnosis, poor patient experience and less favourable outcomes. Our specialist care lacks the critical mass of expertise to achieve the best for patients and we fail to make the most of new technologies and innovations that we know could help more patients.

"All of this has led clinicians to recommend that commissioners develop whole systems of integrated care that include fewer, larger centres for specialist services for cancer and heart disease. This will save lives and benefit thousands of patients by providing the latest treatments, research and medical innovation."

Dr Edward Rowland, Clinical Director of the Heart Hospital, said: "The new heart centre is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. It's a chance for staff from the current hospitals to work together to design and deliver world-class care for our patients."

Professor Kathy Pritchard-Jones, Chief Medical Officer of London Cancer said: "Too many Londoners die early from cancer and we have to do something about it now. Joining up services and creating centres for specialist care will allow us to invest in the people, technology and research that will give patients the best possible chance of having an uncomplicated operation and fewer long-term side effects."

NHS England as the main commissioner of these services, together with clinical commissioning group partners, is keen to work with local people explore these clinical recommendations in order to consider and develop any options for change.

Today, NHS England has formally agreed to consider proposals developed by clinicians across UCLPartners for improving specialist cardiovascular services in north and east London, and specialist cancer services in north and east London and west Essex.

The proposals focus on moving cardiovascular services at The Heart Hospital (http://www.uclh.org/OurServices/OurHospitals/HH/Pages/Home.aspx) to a new state-ofthe-art centre at St Bartholomew's Hospital (http://www.bartshealth.nhs.uk/ourhospitals/st-bartholomew%E2%80%99s-hospital/) (alongside services from The London Chest Hospital (http://www.bartshealth.nhs.uk/our-hospitals/the-london-chest-hospital/), which are due to relocate in 2014). For cancer, the delivery of highly complex or rare specialist cancer surgery would be concentrated in a reduced number of centres for brain, head and neck, bladder and prostate, renal, oesophageal and gastric cancers. Proposals also suggest reducing the number of haemopoietic stem cell transplant units and consolidating the intensive treatment of acute myeloid leukaemia into fewer sites. This is part of the creation of a 'virtual' comprehensive cancer centre that will deliver world-class cancer care to our entire population.

Big Debate: Remembrance poppy

Each week we look at the major issues affecting east London and invite two people with opposing views to give their side of the argument



The mere sight of them immediately turns the mind to thoughts of remembrance, past conflicts and war-ravaged Flanders fields. Domestic attacks 'do happen in leafy Camden', say pair behind ground-breaking production

Glass House play shatters abuse silence

ON a quiet street in Camden, in a generic Victorian terraced house, the hidden terror of domestic abuse is about to go public.

Our Glass House, an immersive theatre experience, opens the door to the realities of violence and the importance of reporting disputes, in a ground-breaking play that shook the Edinburgh Festival earlier this year.

A small audience — limited to 25 people per show — are given free rein to wander around the house, follow any one of the six performers or flit from room to room. But from every point in the house the audience will witness or overhear more than one act of violence.

"People always make assumptions about domestic abuse, that it only happens in council houses," said co-director Evie Manning from Theatre company Common Wealth. "But it does happen in leafy Camden."

Camden Council has provided the house for the short run of the play,

between residents moving out and a new family moving in. The council have also bought 300 tickets to be donated to various Camden community groups, youth clubs and schools. The audience of one show will be entirely made up of a Congolese and Somalian women's group.

Recent figures estimate

that domestic abuse affects one in four women and one in six men in their lifetime. Aside from the obvious physical impact, the effect of violence on mental health is shocking. Domestic abuse is the most prevalent cause of depression and other mental health difficulties in women, with one third of all female suicide attempts attributed to current or past experience domestic violence.

Ms Manning was first inspired to give a voice to domestic abuse survivors after witnessing her neighbour leaving the house in an ambu-



lance after years of secretly enduring violent attacks. She had been completely unaware of the abuse

Ms White said: "What happens afterwards is just as valuable as the show. We discuss whose responsibility it is. Some people say never report because it could put the woman or man in further danger, but we say, no, you should always report."

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Creating world class care for cancer and heart patients

TWO "super-hospitals" specialising in heart and cancer treatment are to be created in London in an attempt to save more than 1,200 lives a year.

Cardiac services provided at three hospitals will be brought together at a world-class centre in the new Bart's in Smithfield.

At the same time, specialist treatment of five complex or rare cancers at 14 hospitals will be concentrated mainly at University College London hospital in Bloomsbury.

The aim is to repeat the success of centralising acute stroke and trauma

Two 'super-hospitals' for heart and cancer could save 1,200 lives a year

care, which has saved more than 500 lives since being introduced in London in 2010. The aim is that patients will be diagnosed earlier, giving them a better chance of survival, while those with the

worst conditions will be seen by the most skilled doctors.

NHS England London, which today announced that the four-year plan would proceed to public consultation, expects the super-hospitals to become a magnet for investment by pharmaceutical companies – giving patients access the latest potentially life-saving drug trials. It estimates the changes could save 1,117 cardiovascular patients a year and 190 people with cancer.

Cardiac operations will move from the London Chest Hospital in Mile End and the Heart Hospital in Marylebone to an expanded unit at Bart's. About 5,000 people in north and east London die each year from heart disease and 5,700 from cancer.

The majority of cancer patients across north and east London and west Essex will continue to be seen at their local hospital, including those with more common forms such as breast and bowel.

The 10 per cent of patients suffering from brain, urological (bladder, prostate and kidney), head, neck and stomach cancers, and acute myeloid leukaemia, will be treated by a specialist unit at UCLH, then undergo outpatient care nearer home. Stem cell transplants would only be carried out at Bart's and UCLH.

The Royal London in Whitechapel and King George's will lose all their specialist cancer services, with certain treatments also being stopped at Chase Farm, the Royal Free, North Middlesex and the Homerton. Specialist services will remain at Queen's in Romford and the Royal Free is expected to remain a specialist kidney cancer hospital.

Professor David Fish, of UCL Partners, who championed the move, said: "This will save lives and benefit thousands of patients." Dr Andy Mitchell, London medical director at NHS England, said: "Evidence shows that dedicated specialist centres staffed by expert teams and equipped with the best technology and research capability save lives."

Curbs eased on flights between UK and China

BRITAIN and China are set to scrap current limits on flights between the two countries in an effort to increase trade and tourism.

The current agreement, signed in 2004, restricts the countries' airlines to 31 return services per week between the UK and China.

But Transport Secretary Patrick McLoughlin announced today that talks will start early next year on a new deal to relax the rules.

He said: "Improved air links between the UK and China would be good for trade, tourism and forging new partnerships, strengthening the links between our two countries."

Chinese nationals visiting the UK last year contributed about £300 million to the British economy.


Brooks arrives at hacking trial

Minister shrugs off wasted £34m

WELFARE reform minister Lord Freud today dismissed £34 million of wasted spending on the Universal Credit, claiming the new system will deliver greater savings.

Asked about the wasted cash as the scheme was launched in London for the first time today, Lord Freud told the Standard: "Clearly we don't want to waste a penny of taxpayers' money.

"[There was] £34 million of spending which we found we were not able to use as we thought we would as we built the system – it does happen.

"But the context is that the benefits of the system are worth £38 billion."

London bid for Muslim finance

LONDON has a "huge opportunity" to cement the City's growing status as a global centre of Islamic finance, a Cabinet minister said today.

Muslim leaders are coming to London for the ninth World Islamic Economic Forum, the first to be held outside a Muslim country – reflecting London's efforts to develop a sector which is set to grow £400 billion in the next two years.

"The next few days will be a huge opportunity for Britain to not just cement its status as a leading western centre of Islamic finance but as a leading a world player," said Foreign Office Minister Baroness Warsi. "Ten per cent of the top 25 fastest-growing economies are in the Islamic world. Britain is in a global race and we have to look at every opportunity that can lead to growth and jobs for British people."





Chest Hospital [link], which are due to relocate in 2014). For cancer, the delivery of highly complex or rare specialist cancer surgery would be concentrated in a reduced number of centres for brain, head and neck, bladder and prostate, renal, oesophageal and gastric cancers. Proposals also suggest reducing the number of haemopoietic stem cell transplant units and consolidating the intensive treatment of acute myeloid leukaemia into fewer sites. This is part of the creation of a 'virtual' comprehensive cancer centre that will deliver world-class cancer care to our entire population.

Professor David Fish, UCLPartners' Managing Director said: "There has been great progress in cancer and cardiovascular care in recent years but unfortunately these diseases are still responsible for around two-thirds of early deaths in London.

"We have some of the best cancer and heart experts in the country, but our services are often not joined up, leading to later diagnosis, poor patient experience and less favourable outcomes. Our specialist care lacks the critical mass of expertise to achieve the best for patients and we fail to make the most of new technologies and innovations that we know could help more patients.

"All of this has led clinicians to recommend that commissioners develop whole systems of integrated care that include fewer, larger centres for specialist services for cancer and heart disease. This will save lives and benefit thousands of patients by providing the latest treatments, research and medical innovation."

NHS England as the main commissioner of these services, together with clinical commissioning group partners, is keen to engage with local people on clinicians' ideas. CQC

The Care Quality Commission carried out its inspection of our services this month, with a team of over 30 inspectors speaking to staff, patients and visitors at both Queen's and King George and holding a "listening event" to hear patient stories. The CQC also returned to conduct an unannounced inspection into our maternity service and neonatal intensive care (NICU).

We are looking forward to seeing the inspectors' report, which is expected to be published in around two months' time.

This month the CQC also published its "surveillance data" report, confirming that the Trust is in Band 1 for levels of 'risk', alongside 23 other hospital trusts. The CQC used this data to determine which trusts to visit first under its new style inspection regime.

Reconfiguration Update

Following the work which took place last month to centralise diabetes and endocrine care at King George Hospital, and gastroenterology and respiratory care at Queen's Hospital, we are now continuing to move forward with plans to redevelop and improve care across the Trust.

You will be aware that King George Labour ward closed in March, with all births now at Queen's Hospital. We have submitted a plan for investment to expand the special care baby unit (SCBU) at Queen's, which will enable all babies needing this extra care to stay at Queen's rather than being transferred to the King George SCBU, which will then close.

We are also preparing plans for a major investment in the facilities at Queen's Hospital, that will expand the Emergency department (abbreviated to the ED or A&E) and critical care facilities (ITU and the High Dependency Unit). We already see far more patients in the ED than it was designed for, contributing to problems with patient flow and long waits for treatment and admission. This expansion will address some of these problems and also create the capacity needed when blue light ambulances stop taking patients to King George. We also plan to create a Children's A&E with its own dedicated entrance. The plans will boost radiology in the ED, meaning patients can have scans and tests more quickly and without having to wait in inappropriate areas. We will need to submit a business case to the NHS Trust Development Authority for this investment, and this is scheduled to take place by the end of the year.

• In the short term, to help deal with winter pressures and ease demand for beds, we have this week moved Elm ward at King George into the larger Holly ward. This will allow for six extra beds which are being used as an inpatient discharge lounge. We have also opened ten beds on the previously empty Japonica ward, which will be used

as an Acute Edlerly Care ward.

Cancer and Cardiovascular Proposals

NHS England has set out proposals for change in the way specialist cancer and cardiovascular care is organised in north and east London and west Essex.

These proposals have been developed by clinicians from across the region, including representatives from our Trust. The engagement process began on 28 October, with opportunities for patients and the public to have their say and give feedback on the proposals.

A public engagement session is being held on Wednesday November 13 from 5.30pm until 7.30pm at Romford Central Library.

The proposals are to:

- Concentrate the delivery of highly complex or rare specialist cancer surgery in a
 reduced number of centres for brain, head and neck, bladder and prostate, renal,
 oesophageal and gastric cancers. The proposals would affect radical prostatectomies
 carried out at King George Hospital, which would move to UCLH. The proposals are
 part of the creation of a 'virtual' comprehensive cancer centre that will deliver world
 class cancer care to our entire population.
- Move cardiovascular services at the Heart Hospital (run by UCLH) to a new state-ofthe-art centre at St Bartholomew's Hospital (alongside services from The London Chest which are due to relocate in 2014).

New IT Admin System

The Trust is investing in a new Patient Administration System (PAS) called Medway, which staff use to record a huge volume of patient data and healthcare records. The new system will have a lot of new features and functionality to help the Trust run more efficiently and will replace our existing PAS, which is now 25 years old.

The move to the new system is planned for Thursday 28 November, switching off the old system and transferring all the data to the new Medway PAS. We are planning to go live with the new system on Monday 2 December. We anticipate this will slow down the service we are able to provide in a number of areas. In preparation for this, we have reduced the number of outpatient and elective procedure slots, so that patients aren't inconvenienced.

The new IT system will help improve our efficiency and put us in a strong position to bring in electronic patient records, while helping our GPs and partners keep up-to-speed with results and information on our patients.

Nursing Scheme

A recommendation put forward by the Francis Report is being tested at the Trust.

In his report following the investigation into care at Mid Staffordshire Trust, Robert Francis suggested that student nurses should have experience of direct care.

A scheme is now being piloted at various hospital Trusts – including BHRUT – which will see potential nursing students spending a year working as Healthcare Assistants (HCAs).

Only then will they be able to apply for a funded undergraduate nursing degree course.

Lynne Freegard, Head of Education and Learning, said: "We are delighted to be taking part in the pilot programme. As well as testing the model, it will also mean that candidates will have the chance to experience the realities of care so they can decide whether they are committed to a career as a nurse."

Nine candidates have been recruited following assessments and interviews, and took up their posts as HCAs this month.

As well as developing their skills as an HCA, they will also be supported to apply for a university course, with mentoring and coaching opportunities and interview training available.

Global Corporate Challenge

This year, 182 Trust employees in 26 teams joined a 262,000-strong community of workers worldwide at the start line of leading corporate health initiative the Global Corporate Challenge

Over the course of the 16 week health challenge, employees were supported to step up their physical activity levels and record how many steps they took each day. Their achievements were marked at a special closing ceremony.

Overall 182 members of staff, in 26 teams achieved an overall distance of 108,695 miles, burning off a total of 11,020,455 calories which is equivalent to 43,941 slices of cake.

Those taking part walked swam and cycled an average of 14,208 "steps" per day and more than had half lost weight by the end of the challenge.

Midwives walked to the top honours at BHRUT as the Trust's most active team and were ranked 424th on the GCC global leaderboard – no mean feat considering the total of 37,450 teams in the running. Their daily step average was a tremendous 24,022.

Bi-monthly briefing for local partners

Our progress on our financial position

In our last briefing, we described our decision to move into financial turnaround. The purpose of turnaround is to accelerate the development and delivery of safe cost savings and productivity improvements. This is necessary to ensure a sustainable base for our long term financial standing, while continuously improving services for patients and the care they receive.

Turnaround is part of a three-year plan to get us to a sustainable long term financial position. This year, we are concentrating on stabilising the organisation's finances, by ensuring that we take out un-necessary costs and we recover the income due to us under our payment by results contract and avoid contractual penalties. We also need to make these changes at greater pace.

In terms of our progress to date:

- We have already identified in-year £60m (full year effect £80m) of cost improvement schemes, against our original target of £77.5m
- Of these, around £47m have either already been delivered or are on track to be delivered
- This therefore leaves us with an in-year gap of £16m to find
- At this point, we are still forecasting a £50m year end deficit

It would be wrong to think this is all about money – it is also about quality and efficiency. For example, in our colorectal service, a new patient pathway will come into effect on 1 November which will reduce waiting times for an outpatient appointment from up to six months to only four to six weeks. Patients will get an initial appointment where all tests and treatments are discussed and put into motion. This means that their treatment and any follow up can be undertaken much more quickly. Prior to any appointments being booked, all referrals will be vetted by a consultant. This will speed up the process and allow non-specialist cases to be directed to the most appropriate service for each patient's needs.

We must also ensure we are consistently meeting NHS performance targets. The key national targets, covering emergency care access, the 18-week referral-to-treatment standard for routine care and rapid access to cancer care are making a real difference to the quality and timeliness of the care that patients receive across the NHS in England.

Developing our clinical and site strategies

We are developing our overall clinical and site strategies, which will help us to deliver our vision of changing lives across east London, and to provide a consistently high standard of care at all our hospitals. One of the benefits of our merger is being able to create patient-focused pathways across our hospitals much more quickly than before, while ensuring strong local services for local people to a consistently high standard. If our clinicians have a case for change in patient pathways or the location of any services, those propositions will be reviewed and agreed with commissioners. The NHS locally, including the CCGs, will engage with you, other stakeholders and partners, and appropriate patient groups.

Our workforce consultation

We wrote to you on 27 August to tell you about a consultation we have been conducting with our operational management, nursing and administrative and clerical workforce. This follows on from the review we undertook of our corporate functions after our merger in 2012. It is essential that we maintain a skilled, adaptable and efficient workforce that is able to deliver excellent clinical and non-clinical services and fulfil our commitment to research and education. Therefore, over the past few months, we have carried out a comprehensive review of staffing levels and clinical practices across the organisation to help us ensure that our structures and processes are fit for purpose.

We launched a formal consultation process on proposed changes to our workforce on 27 August 2013. All staff were invited to comment and to provide feedback on the proposals. Our recognised trade unions and staff side body have been involved in a pre-consultation process, which included reviewing lessons learnt from our 2012 consultation and including information which staff told us they wanted to see in future consultations.

We had originally wanted to communicate the outcome of the consultation earlier in October, but we extended the consultation period in order to allow additional time for staff to respond, and to ensure that we could adequately analyse the high number of responses we received. On Friday 25 October, we announced the results of the consultation to our staff representatives, and then to all staff. We have recognised the considerable time and effort that colleagues across the organisation have spent in reviewing the proposals and providing comments – this feedback has been invaluable. We have made changes to our proposals as a result, all of which are aimed at ensuring that there is consistency across all sites in each service, that there are clear reporting structures and that front line staff have the supervisory support they need to deliver high quality care at all times. Proposals for changes to cardiovascular and cancer care across north east and north central London

You may already be aware of proposals which have been put forward by clinicians across UCLPartners, the academic health science partnership which we are a member of, to improve the way that specialist cardiovascular and cancer care is delivered across this part of London. The cardiovascular proposal includes recommendations for a world class cardiovascular centre at St Bartholomew's Hospital, incorporating the services at the London Chest Hospital and The Heart Hospital. (The Heart Hospital is currently part of University College London Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust.) The cancer proposal includes recommendations to concentrate cancer experts who provide specialist treatment for patients with rare or complex cancers into bigger teams in fewer centres. As commissioners, NHS England is leading the review and will be leading a public engagement process to seek views on the proposals. You will therefore hear directly from our commissioners with more information about the proposals and how you and local people can get involved in the process.

Investment in Whipps Cross University Hospital

The estate at the hospital needs significant investment, following many years of underinvestment, especially in many of the inpatient ward areas. In late September, we opened a new acute admissions unit at the hospital, adjacent to the Emergency Department (the latter opened in May 2012). The two developments represent an investment of around £27m. The new acute admissions unit brings together care which has until now been provided on three separate wards, all of which have seen better days and are located some distance from the Emergency Department. The new unit is state-of-the-art, and instead of medical teams being split between three wards, a multi-disciplinary team of doctors, nurses, therapists and other healthcare professionals can now work together in a single location.

This will help ensure that patients are seen, treated and discharged much more quickly than at present and in much improved surroundings. The new unit was featured on both ITV London and BBC London news when it opened.

Recent investment in the Whipps Cross maternity unit has provided new operating theatres and recovery rooms, a new dedicated bereavement suite for women and their partners and a new emergency gynaecology/early pregnancy unit. We are now working to bring forward a programme to refurbish all remaining delivery rooms and the labour wards.

We are also considerably improving standards of cleaning at Whipps Cross. Our cleaning contractor, Initial FM, has brought in a new leadership team for the hospital, including a dedicated domestic manager for the maternity unit, and additional domestic staff to focus on key areas – all at no additional cost to us. We have also identified a number of environmental improvements, at a cost of £170,000, which we have been able to make swiftly.

Chief Inspector of Hospitals – detailed inspections in November

As you know, the Care Quality Commission (CQC) have launched a new inspection system, which involves more in-depth inspections as well as dialogue with patients, local people and stakeholders. You can read more about the new inspection regime on the CQC's website.

Our operational performance

In Quarters 1 and 2 we missed two key national targets - A&E four hours and the 18 week referral to treatment target. Both continue to be a challenge, but we have plans in place to achieve compliance.

Emergency access – the "four-hour" target in our A&Es

The target is for 95% of patients to be seen and treated within four hours of arrival. Our year-to-date performance is 94.44%. We have now introduced additional resources, including extra doctors and nurses in the A&Es and assessment areas. Specific changes include:

- Introducing a team at Whipps Cross to support discharge for patients with care needs
 who do not need bed based medical care. This has had a positive impact on avoiding
 admission to the main hospital for elderly patients who attend the A&E
- Creating an additional eight assessment beds at The Royal London to support the high demand for short stay admissions

 At weekends, increasing the number of senior staff and improving access to services such as pathology and radiology is already improving performance

18 weeks referral-to-treatment – ensuring that patients receive a diagnosis and are treated within 18 weeks of referral by their GP

The target is for 90% of admitted patients and 95% of non-admitted patients to be treated within 18 weeks. Our year-to-date performance is 82% and 96% respectively. We have recently introduced plans to improve our processes and recover our position, including improving our data and making a significant investment in how we validate and monitor each patient who is on an 18 weeks pathway.

Infection control

- On Clostridium Difficile, we have had 27 hospital-acquired cases so far this year, against a year-end target of 75 (which is set by our commissioners). Therefore we are performing better than our trajectory
- We have reported three cases of MRSA so far this year. While our target is for zero cases, this represents a substantial year on year improvement from 11 in the full year last year

Getting ready for winter

We are working across Barts Health to ensure that we are prepared for winter, and the increase in demand for acute and emergency care which the season brings. You are probably already aware that the Department of Health has released funding to the NHS to help support trusts during the winter. The funding has been agreed much earlier this year than in 2012, allowing everyone in the health and social care sectors to plan more effectively for winter. We have secured funding of £12.8m to boost our winter care plans, and we are working with our commissioners and local providers to agree how best to make use of the funds. This will include opening additional capacity in our hospitals to meet expected demands for inpatient beds.

The Friends and Family Test

The NHS's national Friends and Family Test is now being used across the NHS to gauge how likely patients are to recommend local hospital services. The survey is currently in use for inpatients and A&E patients, and during October we began rolling it out in our maternity units.

The latest data which is available is for September. For Barts Health, it shows that:

- 24.2% of inpatients completed the test
- Of these patients, 66% said they were "extremely likely" to recommend the service
- 14.5% of A&E patients completed the test
- Of these patients, 61% said they were "extremely likely" to recommend the service

Recent visits and committee attendances

In September, we attended meetings of health scrutiny committees in Newham, Tower Hamlets, Waltham Forest and Redbridge. We also attended the Waltham Forest Health and Wellbeing Board meeting, and hosted a visit at Whipps Cross Hospital from the Waltham Forest Public Health and Health Delivery Scrutiny Sub-Committee, who viewed our stroke, maternity and emergency care services. We also attended a meeting of local partners in Waltham Forest, hosted by Stella Creasy MP, where we were able to take part in a useful discussion about the issues local health and social care organisations face in providing care for elderly people.

In October, members of the Outer North East London Joint Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee visited Whipps Cross for a discussion on our plans for the hospital's estate and a

tour of the maternity unit and A&E. We then attended the JHOSC's regular meeting later in the month. We held a very good meeting with all local Healthwatches, and I was very heartened by the level of engagement and enthusiasm for partnership working. Healthwatches are an extremely important voice for patients and the public, and we very much value the benefit they can bring as 'critical friends'. We also attended a very productive meeting with local NHS, education, council and Healthwatch partners to discuss diabetes care in east London, which highlighted a great opportunity to build strong local partnerships and better utilise the considerable expertise we hold within our respective organisations.

These meetings and visits are a vital part of ensuring that we keep our partners informed and up to date about our work. Please do let us know if you would like to arrange a meeting or visit with us – contact details are at the end of this briefing.

Success for Barts Health at this year's Health Service Journal Efficiency Awards
The Barts Health Operation TLC (turn off, lights off and close doors) campaign picked up the
Energy Efficiencies award at this year's HSJ (Health Service Journal) Efficiency Awards. The
energy saving initiative links energy saving actions to patient safety, comfort and dignity, as
well as driving down our energy bill. Since Operation TLC campaign started in January, we
are saving £100,000 a year in energy bills and avoiding 800 tonnes of carbon dioxide.

Research with the Clinical Research Centre shows that one in three patients experience better privacy and one in four patients experience less disturbed sleep in wards that have been taking the Operation TLC actions. This means we are also creating a better healing environment for our patients.

Trust staff enjoy an evening of glitz and glamour

Local hospital services are changing

Creating world class care for patients with cancer and heart disease

Clinicians from across the region have come together and developed recommendations for improving specialist cardiovascular care in north and east London and cancer care in north and east London and west Essex.

NHS England is leading this work and, working with local CCGs, will be the decision makers on any proposed changes following engagement and the development of a business case. They are expected to launch a public engagement process in October focusing on the following clinical recommendations:

- To move cardiovascular services at the Heart Hospital to a new state-of-the-art centre at St Bartholomew's Hospital (alongside services from The London Chest which are due to relocate in 2014)
- To concentrate the delivery of highly complex or rare specialist cancer surgery in a reduced number of centres for brain, head and neck, bladder and prostate, renal, oesophageal and gastric cancers. To reduce the number of haemopoietic stem cell transplant units and to consolidate the intensive treatment of acute myeloid leukaemia into fewer sites. This is part of the creation of a 'virtual' comprehensive cancer centre that will deliver world class cancer care to our entire population.

The engagement process will provide opportunities for the public, patients, staff and other stakeholders to discuss the clinical proposals above, among other options for change, before commissioners develop their recommendations for change. These would be subject to formal engagement or consultation in the New Year.

Together, cancer and cardiovascular disease account for two thirds of all premature deaths before the age of 75 years in London. Stakeholders from across the region recognised the opportunity to improve the outcomes for this group of people who suffer from major inequality on life expectancy. In response, the proposals were developed by clinical teams across the partnership, building

on the work originating from the models of care produced by commissioners in 2010.

If commissioners decide to proceed with these proposals, there would be a greater focus on the improvement and seamless integration of care across the entire pathway, spanning prevention and early diagnosis through to treatment in the person's preferred setting of care. It would create world-class centres of excellence that specialise in providing care of the highest standards for people needing the most complex treatment, while enabling other services to focus on enhancing the quality of rehabilitation and care beyond hospital treatment. It would allow care to be delivered within an integrated, comprehensive network that delivers the latest treatments, research and medical innovation to the right people at the right time in a setting that most suits their needs.

The expected timeline

- Late October November: initial engagement to hear views of local people and staff on the recommendations
- December: NHS England take on board local views and finalise the business case
- January to March: if deemed necessary, formal engagement or consultation to take place
- May 2014: decision by NHS England on whether to proceed with changes.

Improving the pace of treatment

mportant projects that have started at our Trust include Triage and Rapid Elderly Assessment Treatment (TREAT) and Post Acute Care Enablement (PACE).

TREAT is a multi-disciplinary team based in the new Acute Assessment Unit at Barnet Hospital's Emergency Department. They will provide rapid assessment with admission avoidance for patients aged over 80, allowing patients to return home without the need for a hospital admission.


The desired outcome for this work is both admission avoidance and prevention of reattendance to the Emergency Department by ensuring that the best care for elderly patients is provided in the most suitable care setting.

The multi-disciplinary team will include Care of the Elderly Consultants, junior doctors, occupational therapists and specialist nurses who will review elderly patients and where necessary provide further assessment via follow up (in hospital outpatient clinics). A clinical management plan will be developed, redirecting the patient into pathways in the community.

PACE provides early supported discharge for patients who are not yet medically fit but are able to finish their current care in their own home. The desired outcome is to reduce length of stay and improve patient flow across the system by providing clinically safe care in a more pleasant surrounding.

A case-finder from Central London Community Healthcare, based at Barnet Hospital, will work with medical teams to 'pull' patients from secondary care into community services to be cared for at home. PACE will also work closely with the TREAT service.

Both TREAT and PACE commenced in September, although TREAT won't be fully launched until December.

→ 'Avoidable' Emergency Admissions Among the Elderly Increasing

The Care Quality Commission (CQC) has published expert analysis on the way people experience health and adult social care in England.

Findings from more than 35,000 inspections underpin its fourth annual State of Care report, which considers how care is delivered in hospitals, care homes, dental surgeries and in the community.



Over 35,000 inspections underpin the findings

Key findings include:

- → More than half a million people aged 65 and over were admitted as an emergency to hospital with 'avoidable' conditions in the last year - including almost one in ten aged 75+ (396,000 people)
- → The number of 'avoidable' emergency admissions varies from place to place, with some parts of the country managing much better than others
- People with dementia continue to have poorer outcomes in hospital

The report also says that 1 in 10 inspections found poor care while the number of doctors, consultants and qualified nurses rose.

Flu Vaccination Initiative at Pharmacies

NHS England (London Region) has launched a new community pharmacy initiative that will see over 1100 pharmacies across London working together to provide free NHS flu vaccinations to at-risk groups this winter.

The service, which is the first of its kind, has been commissioned by NHS England (London Region), and has been developed with Local Pharmaceutical Committees in London. The service will provide NHS flu vaccinations, free of charge to those patients that should be vaccinated.

Over 1100 community pharmacies across London are providing the service, complementing the existing service provided by GP practices. The service will make it easier for patients and residents, including those not registered with a GP, who are at greater risk of further complications as a result of flu, to access the free service from any participating pharmacy in London whether it's near their place of work, where they shop or where they live.

The service is also available to all NHS frontline health staff to protect them against flu, so they can continue to support London's vulnerable patient population this winter. This also ties in with the annual public health campaign to get patients vaccinated during October and early November. The seasonal flu service is available now at selected pharmacies across London.

→ How to Make Personalisation 'Core Business' in Mental Health

Compared to adult social care, mental health is lagging behind on personalisation - partly as a result of the continued dominance of the clinical model of mental health.

In Stockport, things are different. Four years on from the town piloting personal budgets, over 350 people now use them to buy services they feel will boost their mental health recovery, whether it's a personal assistant, bike or photography equipment.



The clinical model of mental health 'still dominates'

Social worker Nick Dixon, commissioning manager at Stockport council, admits that the process of making personalisation - or self-directed support - "core business" in mental health services hasn't been quick or easy.

"We've been working on this for 10 or 12 years in terms of changing the culture in services," says Dixon. "That's not to say the clinical model isn't important - of course it is - but to us the weighting was all wrong. It was to the exclusion of what matters to people's lives."

So how has Stockport succeeded in offering personalisation in mental health when so many other councils are failing to do so?

Dixon says that the backing of local councillors and senior leaders like Terry Dafter, Stockport's director of adult services, has been vital.

Support from Dafter (who is also the Association of Directors of Adult Social Services' mental health lead) was key when Stockport confronted the initial cost of self-directed support. Dixon and colleagues were confident personalisation would reduce dependency on services in the long-term but they also knew that costs could rise in the short-term.

"And for three years the budget went up. That kind of thing makes accountants nervous but Terry just told us to keep going. He's driven by the same values we are. He takes positive risks. Now the data shows that the cost has levelled out." says Dixon.

Support from frontline staff has also been key. When implementing self-directed support, Stockport put in a raft of support mechanisms to engage care coordinators in the process. These included regular training sessions and weekly clinics where staff could raise concerns.

Independent Living Fund Challenge Upheld

The Court of Appeal has upheld a legal challenge by five disabled people against the Government's decision to close the Independent Living Fund.

Comments by judges included "It is simply not possible to infer that the Minister ever considered the proposals with a proper focus on the particular matters to which she was required to have due regard. There is no evidence she directed her mind to the need to advance equality of opportunity. Nor is there evidence she considered the proposals having due regard to the need to minimise the particular disadvantages from which ILF users and other disabled persons suffer or the need to encourage such persons to live independently and to participate in public life and other activities.



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
