Speaker biographies



Dr Phil Hammond

Phil Hammond qualified as a doctor in 1987, became a GP in 1991 and has also worked in sexual health. He was half of Struck Off and Die, who had five sell-out shows at the Edinburgh Fringe, were twice selected for the Perrier Pick of the Fringe and won Writers' Guild and Silver Sony Awards for their Radio 4 series. In 2002, Phil fronted '28 Minutes to Save the NHS' on Radio 4, which he extended to a sell out Edinburgh Fringe Show, and a highly successful 60-date UK tour.

Phil has written Private Eye's medical columns, 'Doing the Rounds' and 'Medicine Balls', since 1992, and broke the story of the Bristol heart scandal. He gave evidence to the subsequent Public Inquiry and presented five series of "Trust Me, I'm a Doctor" on BBC 2, exposing wide variations in care across the NHS. He is a strong advocate of patients, both as a Vice President of the Patients Association and a Patron of the Herpes Viruses Association. He is also a patron of the Doctors Support Network, for doctors with mental health problems.

Phil has been a Lecturer in Medical Communication at the Universities of Birmingham and Bristol and currently works as a part time GP in the Bristol area. He is much in demand as a speaker, facilitator and conference chair, and was recently described by Professor Michael Rawlins, Chair of NICE, as "the best chair we've ever had".



Dr Anne Rainsberry

Regional Director (London region), NHS England

Dr Anne Rainsberry joined NHS England as Regional Director for London in June 2012. She came from NHS London where she was Deputy Chief Executive and an executive member of the Board for six years. Anne has worked in the NHS for 27 years. During this time she has undertaken senior leadership roles at local, regional and national levels.

Anne has operated at Board level since 1995 working in acute and community organisations. She joined the Department of Health in 2001 as Director of Development for the South East Regional Office and then moving to lead this agenda across the South of England. In 2004 she became a member of the Department of Health's management Board leading on the delivery of the Department wide change programme.

In 2006 Anne returned to the NHS to take up a Board level role with NHS London and in addition to these responsibilities from 2010 has been the PCT Cluster Chief Executive for eight PCTs in North West London. Here she has led one of the largest service reconfigurations across the NHS and developed a major integrated care scheme covering over one million people.



Dr Howard Freeman

Chair of Merton CCG and Chair of the London Clinical Commissioning Council

Dr Howard Freeman has been a General Practitioner in South West London since 1981. He developed his practice from small beginnings into a very large multi-site practice.

He has been involved for over 25 years in medical politics including chairing his LMC in the early 1990's, representing his region on the BMA Council for many years and helped found, and was an Executive Member of, the National Association of Primary

Care.

Since the middle 1980's he has worked part time as an NHS Manager. He has worked for a Health Authority, for the London Implementation Group and for the Primary Care Support Force. He was Joint Chairman of a PCG which went on to become a first wave PCT. He was Joint Chair of the Professional Executive Committee of Sutton & Merton PCT from 2000. He was NHS South West London Joint Medical Director and Joint Associate Medical Director, Primary & Community Care for NHS London.



Martin Smith

Chief Executive, London Borough of Ealing and Chair of London Health Chief Officers Group

Martin Smith is Chief Executive of Ealing Council. Ealing serves a rapidly growing population of over 300,000 people - one of the largest in London and one of the most diverse in the country.

Martin leads on the health agenda on behalf of the Chief Executives of London's Boroughs. He is an unashamedly proud Londoner.



Mark Turner

Regional Director (London), Monitor

Mark is the Regional Director for London and is responsible for Monitor's regulatory approach to the Foundation Trusts in this region. Mark joined Monitor in December 2011.

Mark has a background in corporate development in both the public and private sectors. Before joining Monitor Mark spent three years on the board of Forensic Science Service, having moved from the Shareholder Executive.

Prior to this Mark was part of the team which transformed Rexam PLC into a leading global consumer packaging company. Mark has an MBA from London Business School.



Professor Yvonne Doyle
Regional Director (London region), Public Health England

Yvonne qualified as a doctor in Ireland in 1981. She has worked in the NHS, the private and academic sectors in the UK since 1989 and has 19 years of board level experience as a public health and a medical director. Her work at leadership level in public health has led to 15 years of close working with local and regional government. In 2010, she was seconded to the Department of Health to support the development of Public Health England, alongside her other public health roles. In March 2012 she was appointed to the role of Director of Public Health for NHS South of England. In April 2013, she was appointed to the role of Director Public Health England (London) where she responsible for working with key partners to both protect and improve the health of all Londoners.

As technical adviser to the World Health Organization she led work on European Healthy Cities and has advised the World Economic Forum, the EU and the World Bank on the public health aspects of population ageing. She is a national lead at the Department of Health on excess seasonal mortality.

Yvonne is a trustee of the Royal Society of the Prevention of Accidents and a member of the major grants committee of The Guy's & St Thomas' Charity. She is also a fellow of the Institute of Directors.



Alwen Williams
London Regional Director, NHS Trust Development Authority

Alwen has been a manager in the NHS since 1980, working in primary care, community and acute services, commissioning and joint planning. She became Chief Executive of Tower Hamlets Primary Care Trusts (PCT) in June 2004, was seconded to the post of Chief Executive of East London and the City Alliance of PCTs in 2009 and in January 2011 became the Chief Executive of NHS East London and the City.

In December 2011 Alwen also took on the role of Chief Executive of NHS Outer North East London leading the two PCT clusters which cover all the London boroughs in North East London: City & Hackney, Newham, Tower Hamlets, Barking & Dagenham, Havering, Redbridge and Waltham Forest. Alwen is a local resident and user of local services.

From 1 October 2012, Alwen assumed the national role of Director of Delivery and Development for the NHS Trust Development Authority.

Professor the Lord Ara Darzi
Chair, London Health Commission



Professor Darzi holds the Paul Hamlyn Chair of Surgery at Imperial College London, the Royal Marsden Hospital and the Institute of Cancer Research. He is Director of the Institute of Global Health Innovation at Imperial College London and Chair of Imperial College Health Partners. He is an Honorary Consultant Surgeon at Imperial College Hospital NHS Trust.

Research led by Professor Darzi is directed towards achieving best surgical practice through innovation in surgery and enhancing patient safety and the quality of healthcare. His contribution within these research fields has been outstanding, publishing over 800 peer-reviewed research papers to date. In recognition of his achievements in the research and development of surgical technologies, Professor Darzi has been elected as an Honorary Fellow of the Royal Academy of Engineering; a Fellow of the Academy of Medical Sciences and in 2013 was elected as a Fellow of the Royal Society.

He was knighted for his services in medicine and surgery in 2002. In 2007, he was introduced to the United Kingdom's House of Lords as Professor the Lord Darzi of Denham and appointed Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State at the Department of Health. Upon relinquishing this role within central government in 2009, Professor Darzi sat as the United Kingdom's Global Ambassador for Health and Life Sciences until March 2013. During this appointment and beyond Professor Darzi has developed his status as a leading voice in the field of global health policy and innovation. Professor Darzi was appointed and remains a member of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council since June 2009.



Philip O. Ozuah, MD, PhD
Executive Vice President, Montefiore

Dr. Ozuah is Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of Montefiore. A nationally recognized physician, leader, executive, researcher, teacher and author, Dr. Ozuah completed his residency in social paediatrics at Montefiore.

In addition to his medical degree, he also holds a Doctorate in Educational Leadership and Administration. He previously served as Professor and University Chairman of Paediatrics at Albert Einstein College of Medicine and Physician-in-Chief of the Children's Hospital at Montefiore (CHAM).

As the leader of CHAM and the Department of Paediatrics, he expanded access for underserved communities, recruited and cultivated outstanding talent, advanced programs of excellence, fostered innovations in medical education, quadrupled specialty case volumes and National Institutes of Health (NIH) funding, enhanced CHAM's regional and national reputation, and improved financial and operational performance. Under his leadership, the Department of Paediatrics became a Top-20 ranked NIH-funded department, and CHAM became one of "America's Best Children's Hospitals." He is also Professor of Paediatrics and Professor of Epidemiology and Population Health at Einstein.



Dr Tim Spicer

Chair, Hammersmith & Fulham Clinical Commissioning Group

Dr Tim Spicer is Chair of Hammersmith and Fulham Clinical Commissioning Group and one of the Programme Medical Directors for Shaping a Healthier Future, North West London's reconfiguration of acute and out-of-hospital services for a population of 2 million.

Tim practises as a GP near Shepherd's Bush and, over the past decade, has contributed to a number of initiatives including the design and implementation of the North West London Integrated Care Pilot and the Whole Systems Pioneer Programme. He trained in medicine as a mature student following a successful career in the Arts.



Dr Craig Tanio

Chief Medical Officer, Chen Med

Craig Tanio was formerly was a partner at McKinsey and Company, a global management consultancy, where he helped multiple payers, providers and international health systems develop strategies to better manage health care cost trends while improving quality. He also worked as the Chief Operating Officer of Baltimore Medical System, one of the largest federally qualified community health centres in the US dedicated to delivering healthcare to the uninsured.

Craig currently serves as the Chairman of the State of Maryland's Health Care Commission, a regulatory body focused on health care quality and access issues. He is a member of the Governor's Health Reform Coordinating Council, which was established to coordinate the implementation of health care reform, develop consensus and providing direction on Maryland's health care reform policies. He holds appointments as Assistant Professor of Medicine at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine and Senior Scholar in the Department of Health Policy of Jefferson Medical College.

He received an M.D. from the University of California, San Francisco and an MBA from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania. He did his internal medical residency at the University of Pennsylvania where he was chief medical resident and a Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Clinical Scholar. He is board certified in internal medicine and actively practices medicine.



Jeremy Martin, Project Director, Symphony Project, Somerset Clinical Commissioning Group

Jeremy Martin is Project Director of the Symphony Project – a ground-breaking programme to bring integrated care to South Somerset for people with long term conditions. Key features of the programme include a linked dataset joining primary, community, acute and social care data together at patient level; an outcome-based approach to commissioning; and the development of an alliance contract for long term conditions.

Prior to that Jeremy was Director of Planning and Performance at Yeovil District Hospital NHS Foundation Trust from 2009 to 2013 leading on service improvement, strategy and business planning, IT and performance. Previous roles include Head of Business Development and Improvement at the Royal United Hospital, Bath; Performance Manager at Dorset and Somerset Strategic Health Authority; Associate General Manager for Cardiothoracic Services at Bristol Royal Infirmary; and Assistant Private Secretary to Tom Sackville, Health Minister at the Department of Health under Virginia Bottomley.

John Wardell

Deputy Chief Officer, Tower Hamlets Clinical Commissioning Group

John qualified from the University of Sheffield with a B.Med.Sci. (Hons) Speech Science degree in 1996. He worked as a Speech and Language Therapist for a number of years before joining University Hospital Birmingham NHS Trust and South Birmingham Primary Care Trust as lead of Stroke Services while undertaking an MSc in Rehabilitation from the University of Nottingham.

From 2003 – 2006 he worked for Solihull Primary Care Trust spending the last 18 months as a Deputy Director of Community Health Services. In 2006 he joined NHS Tower Hamlets as Associate Director of Primary & Community Care Commissioning. John led as Director for Integrated Care Commissioning with a focus on practice based commissioning, service redesign, care closer to home, long term conditions and end of life. He was also the Senior Responsible Officer (SRO) for developing primary care into integrated networks, integration of adult social care with community nursing and integrated commissioning. Professor Lis Paice OBE

Chair, North West London Integrated Care Programme

Professor Lis Paice chairs the North West London Integrated Care Programme, which won the Leadership Academy's NHS Partnership of the Year Award 2012. She leads the Embedding Partnerships workstream of the North West London Whole Systems Integrated Care programme, one of England's 14 Integration Pioneer sites. She has recently been appointed non-executive director on the board of The Hillingdon Hospital Foundation NHS Trust. She was previously Dean Director of London Deanery 1995-2010, and before that, consultant rheumatologist and clinical tutor at the Whittington Hospital, London 1982-1995.

Lis was named NHS Mentor of the Year in the 2010 Leadership Awards and the following year was awarded OBE for services to medicine. She is trained as a coach/mentor and wrote about the experience in *New Coach: reflections from a learning journey* published by McGraw-Hill 2012. She is an enthusiastic grandparent and co-authored *A Grandparent's Survival Guide to Childcare*, published by Bloomsbury 2013.



Jay Stickland

Senior Assistant Director (Care Management)

Jay started his career in Health having completed his Registered Nurse Training in Plymouth. He has worked in health for nine years with the last three years in working in the A&E Department.

He went back to university to complete Social Work training at the College of St. Mark and St John in Plymouth. He then worked in a variety of field work settings including a Community Care Unit. Jay moved to Hampshire County Council in 1992, trained as a Mental Health Social Worker and then as a Team Manager in Adult Services, completing his last two years as an Adult Duty Manager.

Jeremy Taylor
Chief Executive, National Voices

Jeremy Taylor is chief executive of National Voices, the national coalition of health and care charities for England. He joined in 2009 - a year after its launch - and has grown National Voices' reputation as a strong and independent champion for patients, carers and the voluntary sector.

Jeremy is regularly called upon as a representative, expert advisor, writer, commentator and speaker on patient issues. He has featured for the last three years in the Health Service Journal annual list of 100 people with the greatest influence in health. Among his current commitments he is a member of NHS England's external advisory group on strategy, the BMJ patient panel and the London Health Commission under Lord Darzi.

Jeremy joined the voluntary sector in 2007 and was previously a senior official at HM Treasury.



Helen Davies, Former carer

Helen is both a cancer patient and carer. She cared for her mother who had mesothelioma. Helen herself was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2004 and treated at St Georges and The Royal Marsden. She was later diagnosed with Melanoma of the eye and received treatment at St George's, Moorfields and Barts. Helen has been part of an Improving the Cancer Experience (ICE) group at St George's Hospital since 2008 and represents patients at the monthly cancer clinical directorate meetings. Dr Ingrid Wolfe

Dr Ingrid Wolfe, Director Evelina London Child Health Programme; Honorary Clinical Senior Lecturer Child Public Health King's College London; Research Fellow London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine; Co-Chair British Association for Child and Adolescent Public Health.

Ingrid is qualified in paediatrics and public health, which has enabled her to be a children's doctor in a very broad sense of the term. She has on-the-ground insight from clinical practice, and a population perspective from public health. These two aspects come together in her academic work, which focuses on children's health services and policy in the UK and European countries, and in her NHS work where she is leading the development of a new model of children's health care in the London boroughs of Lambeth and Southwark.



Dr Nicola Burbidge

Chair, Hounslow Clinical Commissioning Group

Dr Nicola Burbidge is currently the Chair of Hounslow Clinical Commissioning Group. From 2002 she was a member of PEC at NHS Hounslow, and PEC Chair since 2006. Prior to this, Nicola has been intermittently involved in commissioning for most of her GP career. She is the senior partner of a GP practice in Chiswick.



Professor Ric Marshall

Director of Pricing, Monitor

Prof Ric Marshall is currently working with Monitor as Director of Pricing for the NHS in England. He is also affiliated with the Faculty of Health Sciences at the University of Sydney where, as an Epidemiologist, he specializes in Health Management Information Development. He recently worked on the establishment of the IHPA functions in Australia and the establishment of cross-jurisdiction ABF working groups. He was also chair of the health informatics standards working group IT14-6 for several years.

In addition to his work in Australia, he has managed and advised on health information development and funding reform projects in both the public and private sectors in Azerbaijan, Canada, China, Egypt, FYR Macedonia, Georgia, Germany, Indonesia, Kosovo, Lithuania, Malaysia, Mauritius, Philippines, Qatar, Romania, Serbia, Slovenia, Turkey and UK.
