RSV vaccine now available in community pharmacies

Midlands communications toolkit - June 25 For ICBs and community pharmacies

(Blue – for ICBs, Green – for pharmacies)

This toolkit aims to support you communicate the respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) vaccine being made available in community pharmacies from 23 June 2025. It includes national resources, and further regional resources we have created.

For ICBs, we have developed a press release which you can localise with your own case studies, and details of local clinics. We have also included key messaging and a short narrative which you can share with your local community leaders, and relevant locations such as community centres and libraries.

For community pharmacies there are resources such as posters and social media assets you can use to inform your patients that the RSV vaccine is now available at your pharmacy.

Background

From 23 June, the RSV vaccine will be available in a small number of community pharmacies.

In the first phase, around 59 pharmacies across the Midlands including Birmingham and Solihull, Black Country and Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland. Invites will start to be sent from week commencing 7 July. They will be sent to:

- Those unvaccinated and aged 75-79 years on 1 September 2024, and those who turn 75 years old ahead of the start of the invite campaign
- Individuals will receive emails / NHS App messages and texts first except where there is an accessibility preference for braille
- Communications will be spread over at least a 3 week period to flatten any peaks in demand, with emails scheduled to land week 1, NHS App and texts week 2 and letters landing from week 3
- The national invitation will include a call for action for eligible people to book an appointment at a community pharmacy via the National Booking Service, search for a pharmacy offering walk-in appointments via the finder or to contact their GP.

- There will also be a nation-wide catch-up campaign with materials and media promoting RSV from 28 July
- Invites in other languages will be sent where there is a language preference listed.

Key messages

- RSV can cause serious illness in older adults and babies.
- Every year thousands of older adults and babies are hospitalised for RSV.
- The RSV vaccine helps protect against serious lung infection.
- For the first time, those eligible can receive their RSV vaccine from their local community pharmacy.
- Speak to your local / our pharmacy team or your GP about getting a free vaccine.
- It makes it easier to access and more convenient for you to protect yourself, your baby, and your loved ones.
