At age 16, he worked in the kitchen at a care home washing dishes, moved to care and at age 25 did an access course and went on to do his nursing degree, whilst still working part time at the care home. He worked there as a nurse when he qualified, then became the registered manager. He teaches 4th Year medics from the Uni of Manchester one day per week in the home, and does all sorts of intergenerational work with local schools.

The values of the home are TLC: Transparent, Inclusive and Compassionate, staff are each given a paid day per year to volunteer in the local community



Brian Ruddie is the Quality & Care Governance Officer in the strategic commissioning team for Corporate, Customer and Community Services at Cumbria County Council. He has nominated Sam Munn and Lavinia Grainger from Court Thorn Medical Practice, High Hesket, Penrith, Cumbria. He said:

NHS rolls out capacity tracker after pilot success



A digital portal is being introduced by the NHS and councils to reduce delayed discharge from hospital. The Capacity Tracker details care home vacancies, which will allow health and social care staff to access suitability for a placement. In 2018, around a quarter of a million hospital bed days in England were taken up by people who were medically fit enough to be discharged, but who faced delays in an appropriate care home being found, according to NHS England.

Supporting nursing, improving care

RCN Foundation Professional Bursary Scheme

The RCN Foundation Professional Bursary Scheme offers grants of up to £5,000 per year for career development and CPD activities in the following areas:

Primary care nursing (up to £5,000) Long term/chronic conditions (up to £5,000) History of nursing (previously the Monica Baly Bursary Scheme) (up to £1,000) Occupational Health Nursing in Scotland (previously the Mair Scholarship Scheme) & the rest of the UK (up to £1,000)

Applicants must be able to detail how their course will improve patient care in their field. To be eligible for a grant the following criteria must be fulfilled:

UK Registered Nurses and Midwives Health care support workers working in the UK Nursing Associates Course start date must fall between 1 September 2019 and 1 September 2020

The closing date for applications is 5pm on 31 May 2019.

A rigorous annual inspection that examines care and nursing homes, to evaluate infection control ratings, has seen West Yorkshire based Czajka Care Group achieve an average overall infection control rating of more than 99% across its five homes.

The inspection which looks at the whole home, except the kitchen, checks everything from mattresses to bins, clinical rooms and all medical equipment. It's such a thorough inspection and we are so pleased with the results. We place a huge emphasis on cleanliness and hygiene in our homes and welcome such a rigorous testing process as it reinforces the high standards of care that our residents enjoy

Squeaky clean care home rating is infectious



Konrad Czajka, Managing Director of Czajka Care Group, said:

The identified that infection reports prevention and control management is an integral part of the overall running of all the homes, and that it is always a major priority. The assessors looked at everything from general management, staff health and training, to the guidelines and policies that Czajka has in place. Examining all of the communal and private rooms, bathrooms and visitor WCs. the inspectors also assessed the laundry and linen management, food hygiene, waste management and the handling and disposal of sharp objects. All of the residential equipment was also put through its paces.

"We take infection control very seriously, and prevention is the very best course of action, which is why the whole team put such a focus on maintaining the very highest standards of cleanliness. We pride ourselves on running safe, clean homes that are a real home from home. We also have the Investors in People Accreditation, which recognises the enhanced standards of service our residents receive, and the five star Food Hygiene Rating Scheme Certificate which all five of our homes, and The Clubhouse at Fairmount Park have achieved. All five of our homes have also been awarded the prestigious Gold Standard Framework Accreditation Quality Hallmark Award which is further testament of our high standards."



Warrington CCG launch "The Hub"

Warrington Borough Council currently provide free, extensive and high quality education opportunities for care providers at their training hub at St Werburgh

The Hub training includes elements such as

Safeguarding Mental health related issues and the mental capacity act Dignity

Caring for people with learning disability Undertaking investigations, and much more

However, we recognised there was a gap, as most of the sessions were funded and targeted at care home staff. This meant that our Home Care workforce, providing daily care to the most frail and vulnerable in their own homes, often with no supportive health network, receive the least training in clinical skills. Consequently that often left care givers with no option but to resort to the default of 111 or 999 and a potential acute admission. This identified a need to collaborate within Warrington.

We identified a need to provide appropriate skills to unqualified care providers, with a view to reducing unnecessary use of acute services and to improve service user and carer experience by increasing the chance they will receive the right care at the right time, in the best place for them

It was proposed a clinical skills hub should be developed in Warrington, for access by third sector health and social care providers. We agreed we will share education, helping to improve recognition and management of common situations which if undiagnosed often result in an A&E visit or admission.

Common themes will be covered on a rolling programme of training, including

Recognition of the deteriorating patient End of life care Urinary tract infections Ear care PEG tube stoma and catheter care Prevention of constipation pressure area care

There will also be opportunities to deliver bespoke education as the need arises, such as

Venepuncture	Care planning
Core care skills	Verification of death for nurses
Introduction to catheters, pegs or stomas	Diabetes
Syringe driver training for nurses	Delegated tasks, such as administering drops and patches
Basic understanding session for care staff,	Catheterisation and catheter care
including performing and understanding observation	
Record keeping	Spinal injury management

The project will also help develop and sustain a workforce capable of caring safely for the most frail and / or elderly members of the population for years to come, and it will support the transition programme to community based care.

Funding decisions need more consideration; going forward providers will contribute to the cost, but this means they will have

unlimited access to the most appropriate training for their workforce on a rolling programme throughout the year

The first months sessions are already booked up!
