

Flu Communication Campaign 2017-18

Communications toolkit

Produced to aid increased awareness and uptake of the flu vaccination in two of the identified 'at risk' groups – individuals with a learning disability and their carers. Designed for and distributed to the 14 Transforming Care Partnerships, CCG's, providers, GP practices, charities and advocacy groups across the south of England.

When

Campaign messaging will run at set weeks throughout the winter period to make a splash and maximise impact across the south. Support this by scheduling relevant messaging at the same time(s), throughout:

- w/c 13 November 2017 and w/c 22 January 2018 people with learning disabilities
- w/c 11 December 2017 and w/c 19 February carers

Why

It is well recognised that <u>people with learning disabilities have poorer physical and mental health</u> compared to others, and a lower life expectancy. Whilst there is no record of how many individuals with a learning disability/autism access flu vaccinations annually, children and adults with learning disabilities are <u>clearly identified as a clinically 'at risk' group</u>, eligible for a flu jab as part of the annual flu programme. In addition, this year carers can now also receive a free flu jab to help protect the people they care for.



Key messages

People with learning disabilities:

- Do not wait get the flu jab as soon you can.
- See your doctor, nurse or a pharmacist about getting your free flu jab.
- The flu jab is free because you need it. If you do not have the flu jab you could get very ill and have to go to hospital.
- The flu jab is an injection in your arm. Do not let this stop you. The doctor, nurse, pharmacist, your carers or a friend will look after you.
- The flu jab is very quick and can protect you from getting very ill.
- Terrified of needles? Ask your doctor or the pharmacist about the nasal vaccine.

Carers of people with learning disabilities:

- Care for someone with a learning disability? Get the flu jab so you do not get ill or pass the virus on.
- Carers can have a free flu jab. Protect the person you care for and organise your flu jab today.
- Care for someone with a learning disability? You and they can have a free flu jab. Contact your Doctor or a pharmacist today and stay well this winter.

Do you have, or care for someone, with a learning disability?

They, and you, are entitled to a FREE flu vaccine.

Anyone can catch flu. Flu is caused by a bug called a virus. Flu can make you, your loved one or the person you care for feel ill. If someone is very ill with the flu they might even have to go to hospital.

Having the flu jab can help stop you from catching the flu and passing it onto other people. The jab is free to people with a learning disability and their carer's.

The flu jab is a quick and easy injection. After the jab you may feel a bit hot, have a sore arm and ache a bit, but you would feel a lot worse if you caught the flu.

The national flu campaign supporting the 2017-18 Flu Immunisation programme, which runs from September to March 2018, launched in October 2017, to encourage uptake of the free flu vaccination, particularly amongst at risk groups Individuals with a learning disability are identified as an 'at risk' group and are therefore entitled to a free flu vaccine.

As such, NHS England South will be promoting advice and raising awareness of the importance of individuals with a learning disability, their families and carers, getting the flu vaccination during the following set weeks:

- w/c 13 October 2017 and w/c 22 January 2018 people with learning disabilities
- w/c 11 December 2017 and w/c 19 February carers

We would be very grateful if you could help us raise awareness with your [patient / members / customers] during these weeks by sharing/displaying the easy read poster in your buildings/waiting rooms.

Evaluation

Public Health England Screening and Immunisation teams do not currently record flu vaccinations uptake in individuals with a learning disability, which makes evaluating the impact of communications extremely challenging. Likewise, there is no way to access data on the number of family members or carers who opt to get the flu jab as a result of targeted campaign messaging. Therefore specific evaluation metrics are being used to measure the success and impact of communications, which requires your help.
