Recently, I led on the Accreditation process which is awarded by the Royal College of Psychiatrists (RCPsych). The accreditation entails the gathering of information and evidence covering all aspects of nursing care, for those patients on the Dementia Assessment and Functional Assessment Unit.

My role is to coordinate and submit the evidence required from anonymous questionnaires completed by patients, carers and staff, to communicate with staff on both units and to put in place ways to meet the criteria set by the RCPsych.

This is a rewarding experience, as it made the whole team examine practice, put in place some new processes and achieve high levels of care.

What would you say to someone considering a career in nursing & midwifery?

Nursing is one of the most rewarding and fulfilling careers you could ever choose!
