#### JCVI issues updated advice on COVID-19 vaccination of young people aged 16 to 17

The JCVI announced on 4<sup>th</sup> August 2021 advising that all 16- and 17-year olds will be eligible to receive their first dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine. Please see further details of this announcement here.

#### JCVI guidance in relation to COVID-19 vaccinations for children and young people

<u>JCVI statement</u> advises that children and young people aged 12 years and over with **specific underlying health conditions** that put them at risk of serious COVID-19, should be offered COVID-19 vaccination.

### Pregnancy and vaccination

Since 16 April, the JCVI has recommended that pregnant women should be offered the Pfizer or Moderna COVID-19 vaccines alongside the general population.

NHSE&I has <u>written</u> to all maternity and primary care services on 30/07/2021 asking them to make every contact count in providing evidence-based advice to women on the benefits of vaccination in pregnancy for them and their babies.

Vaccination sites must also be prepared and have capacity in place to provide this essential advice. You can access <a href="Public Health England">Public Health England</a> and <a href="Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists">Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists</a> leaflets to help support answering any questions or concerns pregnant women may have around the vaccine.

Latest data <u>published on 25 July by UKOSS</u> suggests that the Delta variant is associated with an increased risk of severe illness among hospitalised pregnant women, compared with the Alpha and 'wildtype' variants of previous waves. The research also shows that of 171 pregnant women admitted to hospital between 16 May and 11 July, none had been fully vaccinated.

#### Consent and the national protocol

NHSE/I would like to remind colleagues of the principles around consent that are defined in the national protocol. We request that colleagues use this framework to support a review of their consent models and ensure they comply with the national protocol legislation.

The protocol states that the clinical assessment and consent process must be carried out by a trained registered healthcare professional only, and not <u>all</u> registered healthcare professionals can undertake this task. Please consult the "Characteristics of Staff" section in the National Protocol for Pfizer, AstraZeneca and Moderna for full information on accepted staffing groups.

The use of self-assessment apps or non-registered workforce, to support with pre-screening prior to arriving at the vaccination centre, is permitted but the actual assessment and consent on site must be carried out by a registered healthcare professional. The National Protocol does not allow delegation of Phase 1 (clinical assessment & consent) to a non-registered member of staff on the day of the vaccination. Sites are reminded that local policies cannot overwrite the legal framework of the National Protocol.

#### **Key Learning re cold chain incidents**

With the vaccination programme operating at such a high level all settings should remain familiar with best practise and the processes for maintaining the cold chain.

Key points to consider include:

- ensure daily monitoring occurs on all days vaccine is held in the fridge
- check that your data logger has an SD card, or equivalent functionality, and be prepared to download data when you report a cold chain incident
- ensure named individuals are identified each day to be responsible for stock monitoring and cold chain management
- keep clear records and have visible aide memoires as needed to ensure expiry times are not exceeded.

If you experience a cold chain or any other clinical incident report it promptly to ICARS <a href="mailto:england.swicars@nhs.net">england.swicars@nhs.net</a> and they will support your investigation and any mutual aid required for vaccine supply.

#### Fridge faults affecting vaccine supply for all models of delivery

Where a fridge fault affects vaccine supply site should follow these steps.

- report to ICARS team <u>england.swicars@nhs.net</u> copying in <u>england.swcovid19-</u> voc@nhs.net
- report the fridge to Unipart so a replacement can be ordered Unipart Customer Service

#### Managing challenging behaviours at vaccination sites guide for Site Managers

This <u>guide</u> is for site managers in COVID-19 vaccination settings. It reinforces safety and security messages available in existing guidance and standard operating procedures.

Site managers are responsible for the safety, security and wellbeing of all staff and volunteers at the site. They are encouraged to display information on safety and security in volunteer and staff areas, and to use the content in this pack with safety awareness steps to take by staff and volunteers should they come across challenging behaviours and reinforce key messages. Individuals may become challenging for a number of reasons such as fear of needles, anxious about being in public having isolated, worried about protecting loved ones or fear they might catch the virus etc. Site Managers can help staff and volunteers to de-escalate challenging

behaviours by using team stand-up meetings to remind everyone to listen with empathy to bring calm to a situation and a safe outcome.

Please use the pack to outline to staff and volunteers how they can help manage challenging behaviours and display the posters included at your sites. Site Managers can use the pack as a complementary set of resources should local staff/volunteer safety and wellbeing policies and communications be in place.

#### NHS London's Curbsights research on young Londoners - The Vaccine Variables.

This recent report, explores attitudes towards vaccine uptake amongst young Londoners, aged 18-24 and from Black African, Black African Caribbean and Eastern European communities. The report will give an insight into:

- the barriers and motivations to vaccine uptake
- · what you can do to encourage vaccine uptake

The key findings were that Young People:

- Don't see why they need to take the vaccine
- Want to return to normality
- Need to be spoken to directly and personally
- Have been swayed by talking to medical professionals.
