## World Immunisation Week Round Up

With one in ten children in England not up to date with their vaccinations and at risk of becoming seriously unwell, the aim of World Immunisation Week (24-30 April) has been to encourage people to make sure they are up to date with their routine vaccinations at all life stages. In particular, we are asking all parents to check if their children are up to date with their MMR vaccines to protect them against measles, mumps and rubella.

Although World Immunisation Week has drawn to a close.... the journey does not end here! A fantastic range of content is still available to remind parents/carers how important routine immunisations are, reassure them about safety, and help them understand which vaccines are available to their child(ren) and when.
