Why vaccinate children now?



- Children must be prioritised early in the season to reduce transmission. By offering protection
 against the most prevalent strains of the influenza virus, it also helps to reduce the transmission of
 influenza in the wider population, some of whom are most at risk of serious illness or death should
 they develop influenza. This could be family members such as grandparents or even great
 grandparents.
- To ensure minimal impact on routine immunisations in the new year.
- To prevent children, especially those with underlying health conditions and in 'at-risk- groups, from getting seriously ill from flu and ending up hospital and adding additional pressures to hospitals during an already busy winter period.

Children under 9 years of age in a clinical risk group^(N) who have never had a flu vaccination will need 2 doses at least 4 weeks apart



(i) Aged 2 years on 31 August 2023, unless in a clinical risk group.
(ii) If the parent of an eligible child declines LAIV because of its porcine gelatine content, they can request an alternative injectable vaccine.
OIVc is available to order from immForm for these children.

(iii) QIVe is not supplied by ImmForm.

(iv) Or a child who is a household contact of an immunocompromised individual.

Which children <u>can</u> have their vaccine in a GP setting?



All 2- and 3-year-olds:	Age 6 months to 18 years and in an at-risk category:	Any child or young person (up to age 18) who is registered as a carer:
All children aged 2 or 3 years on 31 August 2023 are eligible for a flu vaccine from 1 September 2023. GP practices should prioritise vaccination of 2 and 3-year-olds with LAIV over vaccination of adult cohorts; and commence as early as possible after the flu vaccine becomes available.	Please invite all at risk children to be vaccinated as soon as possible. School-aged children in a clinical risk group can receive their vaccination at school OR at their registered GP practice. However, general practices should continue to invite eligible school aged children in clinical risk groups for flu vaccination to ensure that they can access a vaccine before flu starts to circulate, where school sessions may be scheduled for later in the season or have been missed.	Please invite all young carers to be vaccinated. Anyone who is in receipt of a carers allowance, a part time carer or the main carer of an older or disabled person, or a young carer, is also eligible for a flu vaccine from their registered GP. For example, a young carer looking after a disabled or vulnerable sibling or parent. If the carer falls ill the welfare of the person/s they look after may be at risk. It is important carers are protected, so they can continue to give care to those they support and stay healthy throughout flu season.

GP practices should ensure they have ordered sufficient vaccine to vaccinate the above cohorts with the aim of meeting or exceeding the levels of uptake achieved in 2022/23.

Vaccine can be ordered through Immform. Providers are expected to deliver a 100% offer to eligible groups.

Which children cannot have their vaccine in a GP setting?



School Aged Children (excluding clinically at-risk):

If school aged children miss a vaccination in school due to absence, are home educated or decline the nasal flu vaccine due to the porcine gelatine content, they will be vaccinated later at a 'catch-up session'.

Parents of children will be contacted by the School Aged Immunisation Team with details of the catch-up clinic they should attend. Should a parent contact a surgery requesting a vaccination, and their child is NOT in an at-risk group, please signpost them to the relevant provider.

Ways to increase uptake



- Inform and invite children and adults in eligible groups for flu vaccination during face-to-face interactions, whenever the opportunity arises.
- Ensure the invitation comes from a healthcare practitioner that they know, such as a practice nurse, midwife, doctor, or health visitor.
- Advise parents/carers about the benefits of flu vaccination. Do this whenever the opportunity arises, for example when they attend routine appointments or for other childhood immunisations/vaccination programmes such a pre-school boosters.
- Consider how local stakeholders can help promote the flu vaccination such as pre-school/nursery settings, maternity and health visitor services.
- Think about how you can make your practice/clinic room more child friendly for their vaccination i.e. tv showing children's programmes in the waiting room, having water and a healthy snack available, having stickers as a reward.

Ordering vaccine stock



Vaccines are only available for ordering through the ImmForm website. This ensures ordering is easier and more effective and efficient.

You will need to supply your:

- NHS code (e.g. practice code)
- delivery address
- name, email and phone details (of the key contact responsible for placing orders)



Cold chain management

To help avoid vaccine wastage through cold chain incidents, here are some helpful hints:

A validated vaccine fridge must be:

- suitable for the storage of vaccines between +2 and +8C a midrange of +5C is good practice
- locked or kept in a locked room
- used only to store vaccines and medicines, i.e., food or specimens must not be stored alongside vaccines
- large enough to hold the stock and allow sufficient space around the vaccine packages for air to circulate
- wired into switch-less sockets to avoid them being turned off accidentally
- safe for example, by carrying out visual inspections and P&T testing. Vaccines stored in validated vaccine fridges must be kept in their original packaging







Keep your vaccines heal+hy When ordering

- Order when you have two to four weeks' worth of stock left
- You can make weekly orders, so it's best to order smaller.
- Some vaccines come in multidose packs check you order the correct number of doses
- Check Vaccine Update newsletter for latest information

When receiving your order

- Check your delivery is correct and undamaged before
- Refrigerate the stock as soon as you have checked it off against the order
- Do not over fill the fridge as this restricts the airflow
- Ensure the shortest-dated stock is placed at the

When stocking your fridge

- Check expiry dates regularly never use
- Keep vaccines in their original packaging in the main part of the fridge, not
- Keep your fridge door locked at all times Keep the opening of the fridge door to
- thermometer and keep a daily record of the temperatures Have back-up storage for your vaccines in case
- Position the fridge away from heat sources and mark or tape the fridge plug to avoid it being turned
