Getting your free NHS RSV vaccine



This is your invite to get your free NHS RSV vaccine.

RSV is a virus. It is also called respiratory syncytial virus.

It affects the lungs and is easy to catch.

For most people, RSV can cause a cough, sore throat and cold.



But some people get very poorly with RSV and need to go to hospital.



People who are most risk from RSV are:

- adults over 75
- babies



You are invited to get the vaccine because:

- you are aged 75 or older, or
- you live in a care home for older adults, or





- you are pregnant and have been for 28 weeks or more.



Having the RSV vaccine when you are pregnant helps to stop your baby getting very unwell from RSV for the first few months after they are born.

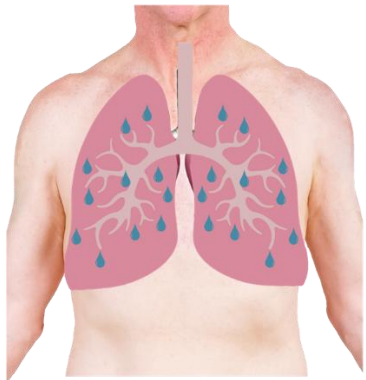


You will need 1 dose of the vaccine each time you are pregnant.



If you are aged 75 or over, or you live in a care home, you only need your RSV vaccine once.

Why is it important to get the RSV vaccine?



RSV can cause serious infections in the lungs, like pneumonia.



Babies and older adults with RSV are more likely to get so poorly they need to go to hospital.



Sometimes, people die from getting RSV.



This is why it is important to get your RSV vaccine.

How do you get your RSV vaccine?



You can ask your doctor's (GP) surgery for an appointment.



Some pharmacies in some parts of England also offer RSV vaccine appointments.



You can check if there's a pharmacy offering the RSV vaccine near you online. Go to www.nhs.uk/find-rsv.



You can get your RSV vaccine all year round.

Getting your vaccine



The RSV vaccine from the NHS is free and you do not need to pay for it.

Tell staff if you need to change the way you get your vaccine, or you need support during your appointment.

These changes are called **reasonable adjustments**.

They can be things like getting information in easy read.

Or, getting an appointment when the surgery is less busy.
